### Letter from the President:

During 2008-2009 Rappahannock United Way took two large, noteworthy steps to position the organization for long-term growth. The first and most visible of those steps occurred in February of 2009, when we broke ground on an 8,000 square foot office building immediately adjacent to the current office. # RAPPAHANNOCK UNITED WAY INITIATIVES

Rappahannock United Way's Community Investment team leads initiatives that enable United Way to improve community conditions and enhance community involvement. We work year round to direct United Way services and community resources to best meet pressing community needs. Here are some of the highlights over the past year:

## Results 2008/2009

404 tax returns filed for low income workers

\$195,938 in Earned Income Tax Credit refunds processed

## Earned Income Tax Credit Coalition

Rappahannock United Way leads a Coalition of local nonprofits and government agencies to assist hard-working, low to moderate income families get the tax refunds they deserve and the financial literacy information they need.

Trained volunteers provide free tax preparation and financial counseling services at a network of free tax sites throughout the Greater Fredericksburg area, to low income workers. Through these efforts they increase their financial assets, improve their financial self sufficiency and enhance their ability to support themselves and their family. The majority of individuals served reported they would use their refunds to save, reduce debt, or pay bills.

20 volunteer tax preparers and credit counselors helped deserving families prepare their tax returns and access financial literacy information.

## 2-1-1 Virginia Partnership

Rappahannock United Way is proud to be a partner of 2-1-1 Virginia, the statewide Information and Referral service. 2-1-1 Virginia helps bring an end to confusing and frustrating searches.

There are literally hundreds of human service organizations in this area. 2-1-1 Virginia provides a streamlined, centralized, and easy to remember telephone number.

An individual or agency can dial 2-1-1 from anywhere in the state of Virginia any day or time. All calls are completely free and confidential.

## Information Services

Through our Information Services program Rappahannock United Way addresses the lack of awareness in our community about available services and resources, and works to bridge the gap between those services and individuals in need. Information Services utilizes a variety of mediums including, but not limited to, Community Connections Directory, Quick Guide, 2-1-1 Virginia, RUW Newsletter, RUW Info Share Listserv, and RUW Info Share Meetings.



## FEMA – Emergency Food and Shelter Program

Rappahannock United Way coordinates the dispersion of FEMA Emergency Food and Shelter Program local and state set aside funds to area service agencies, both nonprofit and governmental, to assist low income households with economic, not disaster related, emergencies.

## Smart Beginnings Rappahannock Area

Smart Beginnings Rappahannock Area is a Rappahannock United Way led collaborative coalition of over 40 public and private agencies, businesses and individuals. With 80-85% of the brain developing before age 5, it is vital that we invest in young children in the early years before kindergarten so they can realize their full potential. Smart Beginnings Rappahannock Area leads community partners in maximizing and coordinating resources that ensure equal opportunities for all young children to be ready for school – ready for life.

## Volunteer Services

Rappahannock United Way serves as the volunteer center for the Greater Fredericksburg area; a strategy to mobilize the caring power of our community through the gift of time and talents. Creatively using a web based volunteer matching database, and organizing special events and projects, we connect thousands of citizens with hundreds of area nonprofits each year.

Individuals, groups, families and businesses can access volunteer opportunities by using the Volunteer Website or the Volunteer Services Helpline (540-373-0041 ext 314).

Volunteer Services also builds the capacity of local nonprofits through training and networking events, and supports RUW programs by recruiting, matching and coordinating volunteers.

Throughout the year Volunteer Services also organizes large volunteer project events called - Days of Service. These Days of Service are a great way for volunteers to get a taste of volunteering on a large scale – joining forces with hundreds of other volunteers in the community to complete special one day projects.

Volunteer Services works year round bringing civic groups, faith based organizations and businesses together into a network of local disaster preparedness, providing a full calendar of disaster preparedness trainings and informational events, along side volunteer recruitment and mobilization services in the event of a local disaster.

More than \$2.8 million dollars was distributed to qualifying jurisdictions to provide emergency assistance for food, shelter and utility costs for low income households in the Greater Fredericksburg area.

The Grants and Technical Assistance Committee leads the annual Citizen Review Process, the internal process to evaluate and review agency programs and allocate United Way Community Care Funds.
