UNDERSTANDING ALICE®

The findings from ALICE in the Crosscurrents: An Update on Financial Hardship in Virginia revealed a stark reality for thousands of families in the Greater Fredericksburg Region. Despite wages for the lowest-paid jobs rising at the fastest rate in four decades, financial hardship persists and is growing. From 2021 to 2022, the number of struggling households in Virginia increased by 87,443. Today, over 1.3 million households, or 40% of the state, live paycheck to paycheck. This includes 359,347 households in poverty and an additional 977,828 ALICE households (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) who earn above the Federal Poverty Level but still cannot afford the basic cost of living.


Breaking Down Regional Impact

- Caroline County: 40% ALICE households
- King George County: 30% ALICE households
- Spotsylvania County: 43% ALICE households
- Stafford County: 34% ALICE households
- City of Fredericksburg: 44% ALICE households

In the Greater Fredericksburg Region alone, the basic annual cost of living for a family of four with an infant and a preschooler rose dramatically from \$84,509 to \$110,177 in just one year. This increasing financial strain is reflected in the growing number of ALICE households in our region, which climbed from over 48,000 to more than 52,000 in the same period. Currently, 38% of households in the Greater Fredericksburg Region are living at or below the ALICE threshold, underscoring the urgent need for community support and systemic change.



EVERY HOUSEHOLD COUNTS



In 2024, we helped 171 ALICE individuals stay securely housed and 18 ALICE individuals to keep reliable transportation, ensuring they could navigate life's challenges with stability and confidence through our Prosper Financial Assistance Program.

SUPPORTING EDUCATION

Quality education remains one of the most powerful predictors of professional and financial success in the U.S.—and a vital pathway for ALICE households to achieve long-term stability. In 2024, we supported local ALICE students by organizing a school supply drive and distributing Little Free Libraries throughout our communities, helping to pave the way for brighter futures.

PROSPER STUDENTS

Rappahannock United Way's Prosper Students program equips students with essential financial literacy and job readiness skills to prepare them for adulthood. Through interactive workshops, students gain hands-on experience in resume building, interview techniques, budgeting, credit management, and independent living skills.

Eligible high school seniors also have the opportunity to earn an education scholarship to support their future success. Avery H., a Prosper Student participant, was awarded an RUW scholarship in August 2023 and is now studying Business at the College of William & Mary.

LITTLE FREE LIBRARY

Rappahannock United Way partners with Little Free Library, a nonprofit organization based in St. Paul, Minnesota, to inspire readers and expand book access through a global network of volunteer-led book-exchange boxes. With our own Little Free Library outside the RUW building, we aim to see these libraries spread throughout our community, empowering individuals by removing barriers to discovering meaningful books.

Last year, volunteers built and distributed four Little Free Libraries, placing them in locations across our region to foster a love of reading and encourage the sharing of books.





FOSTERING FINANCIAL STABILITY

In 2024, we expanded our **Prosper Programs** to create a stronger financial future for every generation. That included helping hard-working ALICE families make ends meet while connecting them with education, financial tools, and coaching to enable the creation of a brighter future.

PROSPER TAX SERVICES

To help increase access to free, easy tax filing services we provided Prosper Tax Services, our VITA free tax preparation services, to community members earning \$80,000 or less.

More than 1,580 individual tax returns were filed in 2024, putting almost \$2 million in tax refunds and credits into the tax client's pockets and ultimately our local economy.

REFUNDS AT WORK

- 665 Tax Clients increased income and assets through tax credits and refunds.
- **556** Tax Clients filed their own returns using MyFreeTaxes online free file software
- **451** Tax Clients participated in financial education activities at tax sites
- 283 Tax Clients saved at least 10% of their tax refund

PROSPER STUDENTS

Our Prosper Students workshops prepare students for the future and offer the opportunity to win an education scholarship. Last year, 264 Prosper students gained valuable skills for adulthood through hands-on financial literacy and job readiness workshops. Among them, 199 students learned to create budgets, build credit, and avoid debt, while 65 students honed job readiness skills, including crafting tailored resumes and acing interviews.

PROSPER MENTORING

In 2024, Rappahannock United Way celebrated the graduation of the first Prosper Mentoring cohort and prepared to launch the second. This year-long program combines group workshops and one-on-one mentoring to empower local working women to take control of their finances, achieve personal goals, and build a brighter future.

PROSPER COACHING

Last year, 25 individuals received long-term, personalized financial coaching through one-on-one sessions with Rappahannock United Way's certified financial coaches.

PROSPER FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

In 2024, we provided direct financial assistance to a total of 189 ALICE individuals - 171 received rent/mortgage assistance while 18 received support for car repairs and/or payments.



EMPOWERING HEALTHY LIVING

Rappahannock United Way is focused on creating a healthier community. We support and implement programs that help individuals and families develop healthy habits, access health resources and avoid risky behaviors. Last year we helped people overcome barriers to good health by improving access to healthcare-related resources and services.

RIDE UNITED

The Ride United initiative seeks to reduce transportation barriers that prevent individuals from accessing vital healthcare resources by providing free ride-share coupons.

Last year, Rappahannock United Way issued over 440 Ride United rides, with over 40% being used for healthcare services.

WELCOME HOME BASKETS

Rappahannock United Way is dedicated to creating a healthier community by supporting safe, stable housing and programs that empower families to build healthy habits and recover from challenges like eviction or homelessness.

In 2024, Rappahannock United Way partnered with local nonprofit organizations, to provide Welcome Home Kits to low to moderate income individuals and families as they move in to permanent, safe and sustainable housing.

Welcome Home Kits include some of the essential items needed to maintain a safe and healthy home – such as a laundry basket, laundry detergent, dish washing supplies and toilet tissue. Many of these essential items can be expensive to purchase. Last year volunteers helped put together 20 'Welcome Home' baskets for local individuals and families.

SINGLECARE

SingleCare is a national partnership with United Way that seeks to reduce the costs of prescription medicines for those in need.

Through our partnership with SingleCare, 2,187 individuals saved \$338,090 in prescription costs through the distribution of prescription drug discount cards to low-moderate income community members.




FINANCIAL REPORT
